## Free School Meals

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are already entitled to a free school meal. However if you are unemployed, receive a qualifying benefit, Income Support or Income Based Jobseekers Allowance you may be entitled to register for free school meals. This is extremely beneficial to your child and the school as those children who register and are entitled to a free school meal via the above criteria, may receive a sum of money into the school which may be used to help your child in their learning. We would urge you to register if you think you may qualify. The parent or guardian will need to complete an application and return it to the school or the FSM office at County Hall. # Strengths and areas for development

As a school we continuously self-evaluate our performance to ensure we can be "*the best that we can be."* We would like to share with you what we consider to be our current strengths and future areas for development.

Strengths:

- Across almost all year groups and in a wide range of subjects, including in English and mathematics, pupils make consistently strong progress, developing secure knowledge and understanding, considering their different starting points.
- Pupils are typically able to articulate their knowledge and understanding clearly in an ageappropriate way. They can hold thoughtful conversations with each other and adults.
- Teachers are determined that pupils achieve well. They encourage pupils to try hard, recognise their efforts and ensure that pupils take pride in all aspects of their work.
- Teachers demonstrate deep knowledge and understanding of the subjects they teach. They use questioning highly effectively and demonstrate understanding of the ways pupils think about subject content. They identify pupils' common misconceptions and act to

ensure they are corrected. Pupils are curious, interested learners who seek out and use new information.

- Governors do not shy away from challenging leaders about variations in outcomes for pupil groups.
- The broad and balanced curriculum provides a wide range of opportunities for pupils to learn. The range of subjects and courses helps pupils acquire knowledge, understanding and skills in all aspects of their education, including linguistic, mathematical, scientific, technical, human and social, physical and artistic learning. This supports pupils' good progress. The curriculum also contributes well to pupils' behaviour and welfare, including their physical, mental and personal well-being, safety and spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.
- Leaders and governors have an accurate and comprehensive understanding of the quality of education at the school. This helps them plan, monitor and refine actions to improve all key aspects of the school's work.
- The school's open culture actively promotes all aspects of pupils' welfare. Pupils are safe and feel safe at all times. They understand how to keep themselves and others safe in different situations and settings. They trust leaders to take rapid and appropriate action to resolve any concerns they have.
- Pupils' attitudes to all aspects of their learning are consistently positive. These positive attitudes have a good impact on the progress they make. Pupils conduct themselves well throughout the day, including at lunchtimes.

Areas for further development:

- To enhance children's opportunities to use and apply their wide range of skills to great effect in reading, writing, mathematics and communication.
- To improve progress and attainment of mathematics across the school.
- To improve the proportion of outstanding lessons across the school.
- To provide adequate time for practice to embed the pupils knowledge, understanding and skills securely.

















- To ensure Governors systematically challenge leaders to secure excellent outcomes for pupils.
- To ensure safeguarding remains highly effective, including protecting pupils from radicalisation and extremism.
- To create a culture where staff reflect and debate the way they teach.
- To establish Philosophy For Children to ensure pupils discuss and debate issues in a considered way.
- To ensure pupils, parents, staff, governors and pupils are unreservedly positive about both behaviour and safety.
